



Inventory of Community Economic Development Tools for Rural B.C. Communities



#### Introduction

Across British Columbia, rural communities are responding to the opportunities and challenges that come with changing times. They recognize that maintaining diverse economies and a strong social fabric are keys to attracting and retaining both residents and investment.

The B.C. government has developed this inventory of programs and initiatives to support rural communities and First Nations who are facing, or may face, economic challenges. This inventory complements other programs such as the BC <u>online search tool</u> (Search Economic Development Funding & Grants).

The inventory contains more than 100 entries and is divided into six categories to help users identify the information they need:

- Urgent Transition Services: Resources available to communities where a major employer has closed or may curtail operations.
- Employment and Training Support: Resources to support training needs for impacted workers and others.
- Community Economic Development and/or Diversification: Programs and tools, including funding and support services, to help communities diversify their economies.
- Business Support Programs: Programs to help entrepreneurs become more competitive and grow their businesses.
- Community Infrastructure Programs: Programs to help communities create jobs and economic spin offs through capital projects.
- First Nations Programs: Programs and services to support First Nations.

PLEASE NOTE: This inventory is a living document. It is not intended to replace other sources of information; rather, it represents a high-level overview summarizing the many types of services (provincial, federal, private sector) available to communities. Information can be accessed at the end of each item, which links users to the service provider's website. While all attempts have been made to ensure the accuracy of this inventory, the appropriate agencies are responsible for the delivery of their programs.
