Christmas Carol Sing-a-Long Relaxed Performance



Welcome to our Relaxed Performance at the Martin Harris Centre.



During the concert

During today's concert there will be a relaxed atmosphere.

The lights will stay on during the concert and the doors will stay open.

There is no interval but you can get up and move around whenever you like. If you want to go out or come back into the concert hall, that is okay too.

It is fine to make noise during the event, and please join in with the carol singing if you want to! If you have any musical instruments with you, you can play along with the carols. If you haven't got an instrument you might like to shake something else like your keys or a baby rattle.

There may be clapping after each carol. If you want to you can clap too.

If the noise is too loud at any point you can cover your ears.

If you need to take a break or want a space to relax, there is a "chill out" area in room G16. You can use this before and during the concert.

There is also a space you can use for:

- Storing prams, buggies and walking aids (items are left at own risk)
- Baby changing

There will be staff members wearing purple or black T-shirts available to help you if you have any questions. The word "Staff" is written on the back of their T-shirts.
