Festive Sing-a-Long Relaxed Performance



Welcome to our Relaxed Performance at the Martin Harris Centre.



It is fine to make noise during the event, and please join in with the singing if you want to! If you have any musical instruments with you, you can play along with the carols. If you haven't got an instrument you might like to shake something else like your keys or a baby rattle.

There may be clapping after each song. If you want to you can clap too.

If the noise is too loud at any point you can cover your ears.

If you need to take a break or want a space to relax, there is a "chill out" area in room G16. You can use this before and during the concert.

There is also a space you can use for:

- Storing prams, buggies and walking aids (items are left at own risk)
- Baby changing

There will be staff members wearing purple or black T-shirts available to help you if you have any questions. The word "Staff" is written on the back of their T-shirts.
